



IMPORTANT DROUGHT UPDATE

Effective June 1, 2016

Four-Day Per-Week Outdoor Irrigation Limit has been Eliminated, While Water Use Prohibitions have been made Permanent by the State Water Board

We are pleased to advise everyone that as of June 1, 2016, Diablo Water District has eliminated the restrictions on outdoor irrigation. However, we are asking all customers to continue setting your irrigation times to prevent wasteful water use such as excessive runoff. Please see reverse side for water use prohibitions.

Diablo Water District has also Reduced the Water Charges by \$0.19 per Hundred Cubic Feet

As a result of Contra Costa Water District reducing its charges to Diablo Water District by \$0.19 per Hundred Cubic Feet (HCF) (748 gallons) we have passed that savings onto our customers.

- * The Tier 1 water rate has been reduced from \$3.26 per HCF to \$3.07.
- * The Tier 2 water rate has been reduced from \$3.49 per HCF to \$3.30 for water used over 8 HCF per billing period.

Thank you to all of our customers who have done their part in conserving water during the drought; and we ask that you continue using water wisely both indoors and outdoors.

IMPORTANT DROUGHT UPDATE

Water Use Prohibitions made Permanent by the State Water Board.

The following uses of potable water remain prohibited:

- * The application of water to outdoor landscapes in a manner that causes excessive runoff;
- * The use of a hose to wash an automobile, boat or trailer without a shut-off nozzle;
- * The application of water to any hard surface unless it is a health or safety issue;
- * The use of potable water in a fountain or decorative water feature, unless it is part of a recirculating system or part of a public recreational interactive water feature;
- * Watering outdoor landscapes during and up to 48 hours after measurable precipitation;
- * Serving of drinking water to customers unless upon request in eating or drinking establishments;
- * The irrigation with potable water of ornamental turf on public street medians;
- * The service of daily laundered towels and linens at hotels unless upon request;
- * Excessive water use in any one day.
